Prerequisites	READ 100 + WRIT 100
Description	This course is designed to help students with Reading, Writing, and Speaking - not only at the Prep. 200 level, but also as preparation for Faculty Academic English courses. It teaches students to analyse short, authentic, texts of current significance. It enables learners to recognise patterns of discourse organisation including rhetorical structures associated with particular genres of writing. This recognition will help learners to understand a text's essential meaning, and to express this essence in a single paragraph.
Objectives	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. To teach students how to analyse a text by identifying a text's key macro-organisational elements according to a range of organisational frameworks: SPRE; Research Report; Discursive; Argumentative; Comparative Evaluation; and Cause &amp; Effect;</li> <li>2. To reinforce learners' knowledge of micro-features that are useful for comprehension, such as lexical cohesion and clause analysis;</li> <li>3. To have students practise these processes of analysis such that they improve reading comprehension more generally.</li> <li>4. To teach students key analytical phrases that can be used both to make their writing and speaking in other courses more explicit and to write a single paragraph.</li> <li>5. To make students more autonomous readers and writers.</li> </ol>
Learning Outcomes	<p>By the end of Analysis and Summary 200, a student will be able to:</p> <p>LO1. Identify macro-organisational elements of a text amenable to analysis as SPRE; Research Report; Argumentative; Discursive; Comparative Evaluation; or Cause/Effect.</p> <p>LO2. recognise particular textual elements that make comprehension easier: lexical chains; clause relations; and long noun phrases which can mask the extent of subjects and objects.</p> <p>LO3. Use, from memory, key phrases in order to explicitly articulate in their own, original, writing, the key elements of another author's text.</p> <p>LO4. Combine descriptions of key elements with an appropriate introductory sentence in order to write, within 30 minutes, a paragraph-length summary of a previously unseen text of a length of 500-1000 words.</p> <p>LO5. Evaluate their own summaries in terms of the course assessment rubric.</p> <p>LO6. Independently find other texts to be analysed and submitted for feedback.</p>
